Remembrance Day:

This is the day sometimes referred to as Armistice Day. It is held each year on November 11 to mark the day and time when all armies stopped fighting in WWI

(The 11th Hour of the 11th day of the 11th Month). It is now a day which gives us a chance to pay respect and to honour all people

who have fought in wars, both past and present.

Many people will wear a Poppy on their jacket. Here is why: In the Spring of 1915, a Canadian doctor by the name of Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae lost a friend in the fighting. He was inspired when he saw a field full of poppy flowers. He then =penned the now famous poem In Flanders Fields. After the war ended the Poppy became a symbol of Remembrance.

On Wednesday November 9th the school will hold their Remembrance Ceremony. Parents are welcome to attend. I highly recommend, if you are coming, to bring a Kleenex as it is a very moving ceremony which often brings us to tears. More information about the Ceremony times will be emailed out later.

Grouse Mountain PAC Fundraiser:

Do you buy Grouse Mountain Passes? They have developed a PAC Fundraising Program that NRP has decided to try. If you purchase a Early Bird Pass (meaning it must be purchased by November 13th), and there are at least 15 sold, our PAC will receive 15% cash back! What that means is if 15 Early Bird Passes are sold under our school code, NRP PAC will get \$1,122.75. If 20 passes are sold, we get \$1497.00 and on and on.

Community Notice to Parents From UNA:

Please Help Mitigate the Noise Problem at Iona Green Park

The noises from children's play at Iona Green Park in Chancellor Place have affected the residents living in the adjacent buildings for quite some time. Qiuning Wang from the University Neighbourhoods Association is working on the mitigation process through community engagement and public education. She is also a Grade 6 parent of NRP, and she is sending the following message as a friendly reminder to the families who live in Chancellor Place and for those who use the play equipment at Iona Green Park.

- 1) Please provide supervision for your children while they are playing at Iona Green Park.
- 2) Be mindful about the noises made from your child's play. Due to the sound reflection of the concrete surfaces of the surrounding buildings, the noises can be amplified to a level that can significantly impact the life and health of some residents.
- 3) In the spirit of "It takes a village to raise a child", if you happen to see unsupervised children who are making loud noises such as screaming and yelling, or banging on equipment while playing, please remind them kindly to minimize their noises.
- 4) As the campus is becoming busier and denser, it is important to foster mutual understanding and respect for others in our kids and our community so that our neighborhoods can be enjoyed by everyone.
