Message from the Executive

VSB Families,

We hope you've enjoyed the summer and that you and yours are rested and ready for another school year. (And ready or not, it's here!)

Every year, there are major undertakings that impact education in Vancouver. Some of the undertakings this year are:

- At the provincial level, a mediator is now involved in the collective agreement negotiations between the BCPSEA, which represents the employers, and BCTF, the teachers, whose contract expired on June 30th. Negotiations are on hold until later in September and at this time no job action is anticipated. DPAC hopes for a timely, fair agreement that puts the needs of children first, but will keep you advised if job action will impact our students.
- At the Vancouver level, a draft plan was created last year to guide facility usage in Vancouver (Long Range Facilities Plan, LRFP). After

feedback from DPAC, parents and other stakeholders, trustees voted on numerous staff and trustee recommendations, one of which was to conduct an additional year of consultation before creating LRFP 2020.

• The VSB will also be updating the renaming schools administrative procedure. We will have a seat on the working group.

Stay tuned for opportunities to provide your input on local initiatives.

About DPAC

The Vancouver DPAC represents the parent voice at the district level. Our members are the Parent Advisory Councils (PACs) in the district (every parent is a member of the PAC of the school their child attends). We can advise the school board on any matter relating to education in the school district and are a recognized stakeholder within VSB with seats on all standing and administrative committees. We work to foster a strong community of school PACs by providing current information about processes, bylaws, and best practices to PACs. We also create opportunities for discussion of educational issues. All VSB parents are welcome to attend DPAC meetings. All 104 PACs have been assigned a DPAC liaison (http://vancouverdpac.org/executive) but you can contact any one of us.

If individual parents at your school need some help understanding the school system or becoming better advocates for their child, DPAC has started training DPAC parent advocates who can help figure out policies, procedures, etc. and support them at meetings.

Public School Employer Collective Bargaining

- Please note that collective bargaining is between the BC Public School Employers Association (BCPSEA), which represents the provincial government and school boards, and unions. DPAC does not have a position but hopes for timely, fair agreements that put the needs of children first.
- Teacher and support staff agreements expired on June 30, 2019
- Teacher recent updates:

 BCPSEA applied to the Labour Relations Board to appoint a mediator and the BCTF agreed to participate in mediation. The two parties met in July and in late August.
 On August 30, the mediator instructed the two sides to recess until the fourth week of September. Mediation will continue then.

• Support Staff:

 Individual boards of education or groups of boards negotiate collective agreements with support staff unions which then must be ratified by the BCPSEA Board of Directors.
